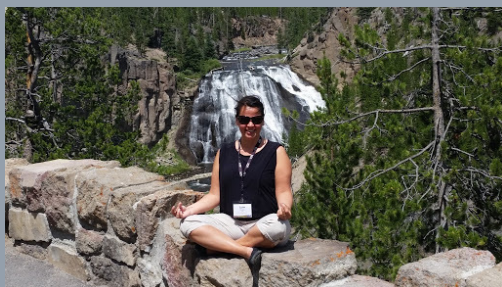
SENIOR ASSOCIATE LETTER

KEY DATES

September 30: NDIT BC Hydro Peace Agricultural Compensation Fund Deadline

As part of the Site C Agriculture Mitigation and Compensation Plan, funding is available to support agricultural production and related economic activity in the Peace Region.

September 30: FPCC Digitization Grant Initiative (DiGi) Deadline

These grants are available for First Nations in BC to support the digitization of Indigenous language resources. The first call for funding ends September 30; the second call will open February 2020.

COMMUNITY RESILIENCY INVESTMENT

The Community Resiliency Investment (CRI) program was created to reduce the risk and impact of wildfire to communities in BC through community funding, supports and priority fuel management activities on provincial Crown land. There are 2 primary components of the program, including the **FireSmart Community Funding and Supports** program, which provides funding to local governments and First Nations in BC to increase community resiliency by undertaking community-based FireSmart planning and activities that reduce the community's risk from wildfire.

Details: Funding is scaled so that applicants with lower risk of wildfire are eligible to apply for up to \$25,000 and applicants with a demonstrated higher risk of wildfire up to \$150,000 per year.

Proposed projects must be located in BC.

Eligibility: All local governments and First Nations in BC are eligible to apply.

To be eligible for funding, applicants must demonstrate that proposed project activities will increase community resiliency by undertaking community-based FireSmart planning and activities that reduce the community's risk from wildfire.

Application Deadline: October 18, 2019

NEPAL

Our Community Analyst Lauren McIvor arrived back from Nepal, where she spent 3 months working as a Branding and Marketing Intern at the Lalitpur District Milk Producers Co-operative Union (LDMPCU). During her time there, Lauren worked with partners and government to facilitate the branding of LDMPCU's products as they enter the domestic dairy market.

Buffalo dairy is a profitable and sustainable business in Nepal. LDMPCU purchases raw milk from member cooperatives in the region and will soon produce and sell its' own products.

The most popular buffalo dairy products are yoghurt, paneer, butter, ghee, and ice cream!
