



BCNWA COVID-19 Virtual Wellness

The circumstances surrounding COVID-19 have increased the demand for culturally relevant wellness services for Indigenous women and girls across BC, as they have suffered the difficulties of increased social isolation due to social distancing measures.

Our team was grateful to have the opportunity to support the British Columbia Native Women's Association (BCNWA) in successfully developing a proposal to fund a series of virtual wellness sessions to deliver culturally relevant support to Indigenous women in their studies. Along with the virtual sessions, participants were sent wellness kits with supplies related to each session. For example, one of the sessions focused on beading, so

participants were sent beautiful beeding kits in advance of the sessions.

The inclusive virtual workshops received such positive feedback, that BCNWA created a second series of workshops for the New Year, with four additional sessions running until the beginning of February.

Semiahmoo First Nation: Boil-Water Advisory to be Lifted

On January 17th, the Vancouver Sun published an article outlining Semiahmoo's pursuit of lifting the boil-water advisory on-reserve which had been in place since 2005, and on and off since 1996. For nearly 25 years, residents on-reserve have not had reliable access to clean water despite being located between White Rock and the Peach Arch border crossing, just 50 km from downtown Vancouver.

As a result of coordination between the Vancouver offices of ISC and the City of Surrey, Semiahmoo is finally on

track to securing reliable and safe water for their Members, and everyone living on-reserve.

Chief Chappell expressed that this is a crucial step towards the renewal of the community, and to welcome Members returning home.

We are delighted to see progress being made by Semiahmoo in this important area.


Water means hope for renewal for B.C.'s tiny Semiahmoo nation says Chief Harley Chappell



ENVIRONMENTAL DAMAGES FUND (EDF)

The purpose of the EDF is to restore the environment and conserve wildlife and habitats in a scientifically sound, cost-effective, and technically feasible way. Eligible activities include:

- Environmental quality improvement initiatives
- Research and development on environmental restoration and improvement
- Education and awareness on issues affecting the health of the natural environment.

The EDF is a specified purpose account administered by Environmental and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) to direct funds received from fines, court orders, and voluntary payments to priority project that will benefit Canada's natural environment.
