For this newsletter, Ronda shares a summary of their workshop, which will discuss Literary Strategies using the Seven Grandfathers Teachings.

Anna and I were honoured to have been selected to present this highly engaging, interactive and practical workshop for the 2021 National Gathering for Indigenous Education. The workshop highlighted strategies outlined in the book *Achieving Aboriginal Student Success* (Toulouse, 2011) to enrich a literacy program while incorporating the characteristics of a character education program. When classrooms and schools are intentional about honouring Indigenous culture and worldview through literacy and character development in a good way, a healthy and positive course can be charted for the Indigenous youth of today who will be the Indigenous leaders of tomorrow.

Based on the Seven Grandfathers Teachings of love, respect, honesty, bravery, humility, truth and wisdom, the workshop explored the specific researched components that, when embedded into a literacy program, will aid in Indigenous student success. Participants were encouraged to share how integrating the methods discussed in the workshop will inform and enhance their pedagogy moving forward.

The outcomes of this workshop were that participants were able to:

- 1. Conclude that literacy success for Indigenous students happens when teachers are caring and create culturally relevant classrooms.
- 2. Recognize that when Indigenous worldview and culture are honoured, students will have a more meaningful connection with the curriculum.
- 3. Apply strategies for incorporating the Seven Grandfathers Teachings into a rich literacy and charactereducation curriculum.
